Distinguished Keynote Speakers

Dr. Natasha Azzopardi-Muscat (natasha.muscat@gov.mt)



Dr. Natasha Azzopardi-Muscat is a medical doctor trained at University of Malta and a specialist in public health medicine trained at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine and the London School of Economics and Political Science. In 2016 she obtained her PhD from the University of Maastricht. Between 2001 and 2013, she occupied various senior positions in the Ministry including Director for EU and International Affairs, Director General for Strategy and Chief Medical Officer. In 2020, Dr Azzopardi-Muscat joined WHO/Europe and was appointed

Director of the Division of Country Health Policies and Systems She served continuously in that position until her re-appointment as Director Health Systems in June 2025. She is an associate professor at the University of Malta and a visiting scholar at the University of Maastricht.

Mr. Martin Seychell (martin.seychell@ec.europa.eu)



Mr. Martin Seychell is a graduate in chemistry and pharmaceutical technology. He occupied the post of Head of Directorate for Foodstuffs and Chemicals at the Malta Standards Authority between 2001 and 2006, and that of Director of Environment Protection at the Malta Environment and Planning Authority between 2006 and 2011. He was appointed Deputy Director General for Health and Consumers at the European Commission in March 2011. He also represented the Commission on the Management Board of the European Centre for Disease Prevention and Control (ECDC) between 2011 and 2020. He was appointed Deputy Director General responsible for Directorates G & R Human Development, Migration, Governance and Peace, and Resources in June 2020.

Dr. Jean Calleja is Faculty of Medicine and Surgery at the University of Malta. Professor Jean Calleja-Agius graduated as a Doctor of Medicine and Surgery from the University of Malta. She further specialised in Obstetrics and Gynaecology, both locally and at University College London Hospital (UCLH). She obtained her Memberships of the Royal College of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists and of the Royal College of Physicians of Ireland. Calleja has been involved in the development and revision of the WHO (Europe) tool for health information system assessments and has conducted such assessments in several countries in Europe. He served as the Acting Chief Medical Officer in Malta during 2014 and 2015. His research focuses on epidemiology, medical statistics, and medical education.

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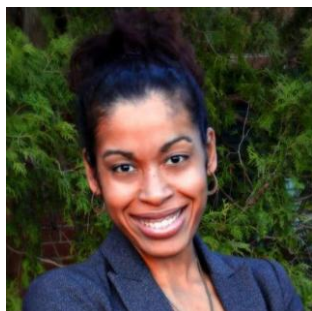


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focuses on the prevention of infectious diseases, substance use and HIV/sexually transmitted infections.

Her research interests are in HIV prevention science in young adults communities marginalized by race, sexual orientation, and gender identity. She is also a scholar of addressing equity and transparency in Global South-North research partnerships. She is adjunct faculty at the George Washington Milken Institute School of Public Health, a Career Coach at Duke Global Health Institute, and Consultant at UCF College of Medicine.

Dr. Angela Requena Suarez is a dentist with a passion for public health. Traveling to the UK, she received her Master of Public Health degree from the University of Edinburgh before training in life coaching to help empower health providers to improve their quality of care. Dr. Donte Boyd (boyd.465@osu.edu)



Dr. Donte T. Boyd is an Associate Professor at The Ohio State University College of Social Work. He also serves as a Visiting Research Faculty member as part of the Research Education Institute for Diverse Scholars at Yale University School of Public Health through the Center for Interdisciplinary Research on AIDS (CIRA). Dr. Boyd's research addresses how socio-contextual factors impact young Black MSM decision-making behaviors. He is particularly interested in examining how the role of the family (e.g.,



parent/sibling support, communication, and socialization) and other important persons in young Black MSM lives impact HIV prevention behavior (e.g., HIV testing, PrEP Use) and other health and mental health outcomes.

Dr. Russell Brewer currently serves as Research Professor at the University of Chicago (UC). He is an implementation scientist and mixed-methods community-engaged researcher whose work has centered on developing and evaluating bundled HIV, substance use, mental health, and structural interventions for highly HIV-impacted populations including criminal legal-involved populations in the Midwest and Southern United States. Dr. Brewer has more than 25 years of experience in public health program development, implementation, and evaluation from a variety of settings (e.g., non-profit, governmental public health).

Dr. Lunthita Duthely holds two bachelors: a BA in Chemistry and a BS in Computer Science, both from the University of Miami (U.M.). She completed her Masters of Science (MS) at U.M., and her Doctorate of Education (EdD) with the School of Advanced Studies, University of Phoenix. She is currently Research Associate Professor at University of Miami's Miller School of Medicine. Dr. Duthely's mCARES Lab is focused on technology-infused, behavioral and educational interventions for women with HIV primarily of Hispanic/Latina, African-American and Caribbean-American descent.

Dr. Typhanye Vielka Dyer is an associate professor in the Department of Epidemiology and Biostatistics at University of Maryland School of Public Health in College Park, MD. She specializes in researching social, cultural, and structural determinants of infectious disease disparities, particularly focusing on HIV/AIDS disparities, sexuality, mental health, and substance use. Her research also delves into syndemics, which are intersecting psychosocial and structural barriers affecting health outcomes, such as the impact of trauma, poor mental health, and criminal justice involvement on sexually transmitted infections (STIs) and HIV outcomes for Black sexual and gender minorities and Black women living with HIV.



Dr. Kristopher Fennie (kfennie@ncf.edu)



Dr. Kristopher Fennie is an Assistant Professor of Epidemiology at New College of Florida. Dr Fennie's research centers on infectious disease epidemiology, namely HIV/AIDS. He has been involved in several intervention (RCT) studies as an epidemiologist, methodologist, and analyst, and has expertise particularly in assessing and modelling longitudinal and multilevel data. His research interests focus on HIV medication adherence, HIV disclosure, internal and external stigma, and trust in health provider. He currently is involved in a study examining patient-centered HIV care, and a study to assess a Qi Gong intervention to improve quality of life among older people living with HIV.

Dr. Jerome Galea (Jerome.galea@usf.edu)



Dr. Jerome Galea, is an Associate Professor in the School of Social Work at the University of South Florida. Galea is a licensed clinical social worker and global mental health implementation scientist. He joined the United States Agency for International Development as the agency's mental health coordinator, in 2024. Galea has worked closely with the World Health Organization on Tuberculosis and mental health integration. He directs the University of South Florida's School of Social Work ACCESS Lab where his work focuses on mental health equity and access.

Dr. Samatha Hill is Assistant Professor of Pediatrics at Emory University. Dr. Hill's research focuses on improving sexual health knowledge and HIV prevention strategies among adolescents, particularly focusing on Black youth in the Southern United States. Her research is inspired by the youth she cares for in adolescent and HIV clinics. Dr. Hill was awarded a K23 from the National Institutes of Mental Health so she can focus on increasing sexual health and HIV prevention knowledge among teenagers. The last part of this study involves refining an app called "HealthMpowerment" so she can improve sexual health knowledge and behaviors among Atlanta youth and Alabama youth (where she first started this research).

Nolan Kline is an Associate Professor in the Department of Population Health Sciences at the University of Central Florida College of Medicine. His research has been funded by the National Science Foundation and the National Institutes of Health. He received his PhD in Applied Anthropology. His research areas focus on health equity and social determinants of health, with particular attention to immigrant policing, LGBTQ+ Latinx social and political mobilization, and the politics of novel vaccine promotion. His research is informed by biopolitics, critical race theory, and political economy of health.
