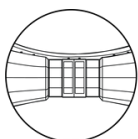

Partnering for Renewal

The library's long-running BYOL (Bring Your Own Lunch) Lunch & Learn series has always aimed to share knowledge with College of Medicine staff and faculty in a variety of topic areas, including work-life balance, technology, and health and wellness. This year, the library had the opportunity to provide a number of health and wellness sessions designed to emphasize physical well-being and health. In collaboration with UCF's new RenewU program led by an interdisciplinary team of faculty and staff across the Academic Health Science Center, staff and faculty attendees were able to experience four lunch and learns presented by a member of the RenewU team. The grant funded program was developed in response to the growing number of health professionals experiencing stress and burnout. Each session fell under one of the program's five physical well-being modules. By providing a space to share this content, the library was able to help the RenewU team meet the program's recruitment goals so that the modules could be shared with those outside of the college.

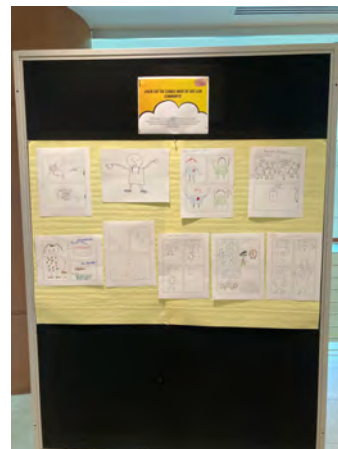


A Continued Tradition of Exhibitions

Each year the Health Sciences Library endeavors to bring high-quality exhibitions to the College of Medicine to share with students, staff, and faculty. In 2024, the library was excited to host two traveling exhibits from the National Library of Medicine, one in the spring and another in the fall.

Exploring the Intersection of Comics and Health

In March 2024, the library was excited to host another traveling exhibit from the National Library of Medicine. *Graphic Medicine: Ill-Conceived & Well-Drawn* is dedicated to the burgeoning field of graphic medicine, a genre of medical literature which combines the art of comics and personal illness narrative. The six-panel exhibit explores the art of comics, which combines words and pictures, and gives approachability and emotional impact to personal stories, as well as to the clinical data they sometimes include. The exhibit was on display in the COM second floor atrium for six weeks. A reception for COM students, faculty, and staff was held on March 12, 2024. Attendees had the opportunity to view the exhibit, enjoy some light refreshments, and try their hand at making their own short comics with some helpful guidance from guest attendees from UCF's School of Writing and Rhetoric.



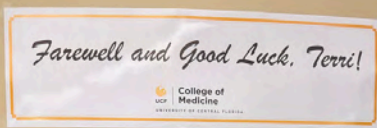

Healthcare for All

In September 2024, the library celebrated the opening of *For All the People: A Century of Citizen Action in Health Care Reform/Para todo el pueblo: Un siglo de acción ciudadana en la reforma de la atención de la salud*, a 12-panel bilingual version of an exhibit previously hosted by the library years ago. The exhibit explores the lesser known story of how movements of ordinary citizens helped shape the changing American health care system. The arrival of the exhibit coincided with second-year student discussions of the US healthcare system through the Health System Science II course, and students were encouraged to come and explore the exhibit for relevant concepts to share within their small groups.

New Hires

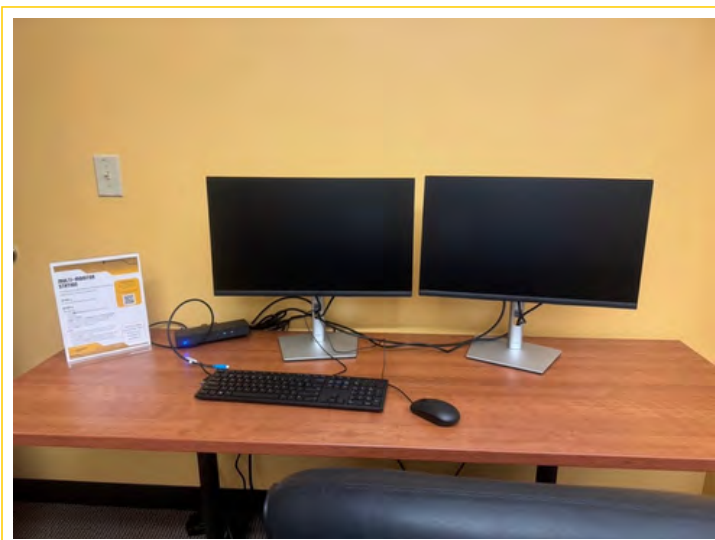

More Monitors Please

The library consistently receives requests for additional monitors from students looking to maximize the use of their laptops. In response to this, the library successfully launched a new multi-monitor station in the spring. Modeled after the station in UCF's main university library, the set up includes two large monitors, a keyboard, mouse, and docking station. Students can dock their PC or Mac laptop and make use of the extra monitors and workspace. Our first multi-monitor station, located in a group study room in the library space, is already popular with students – plans to set up a second station are in the works.



Puzzle Table

In the spring, the library's public services department established a permanent puzzle table in the library space. As soon as a puzzle is completed, usually within a week, a new puzzle is displayed on the table. This low- to no-cost program – supported largely by a vast personal collection of puzzles generously shared by a library team member -- has provided yet another opportunity within the library space for students to take a break from studying, to collaborate and relax, and to engage with library staff. The puzzle table has also been used to highlight various monthly observances.

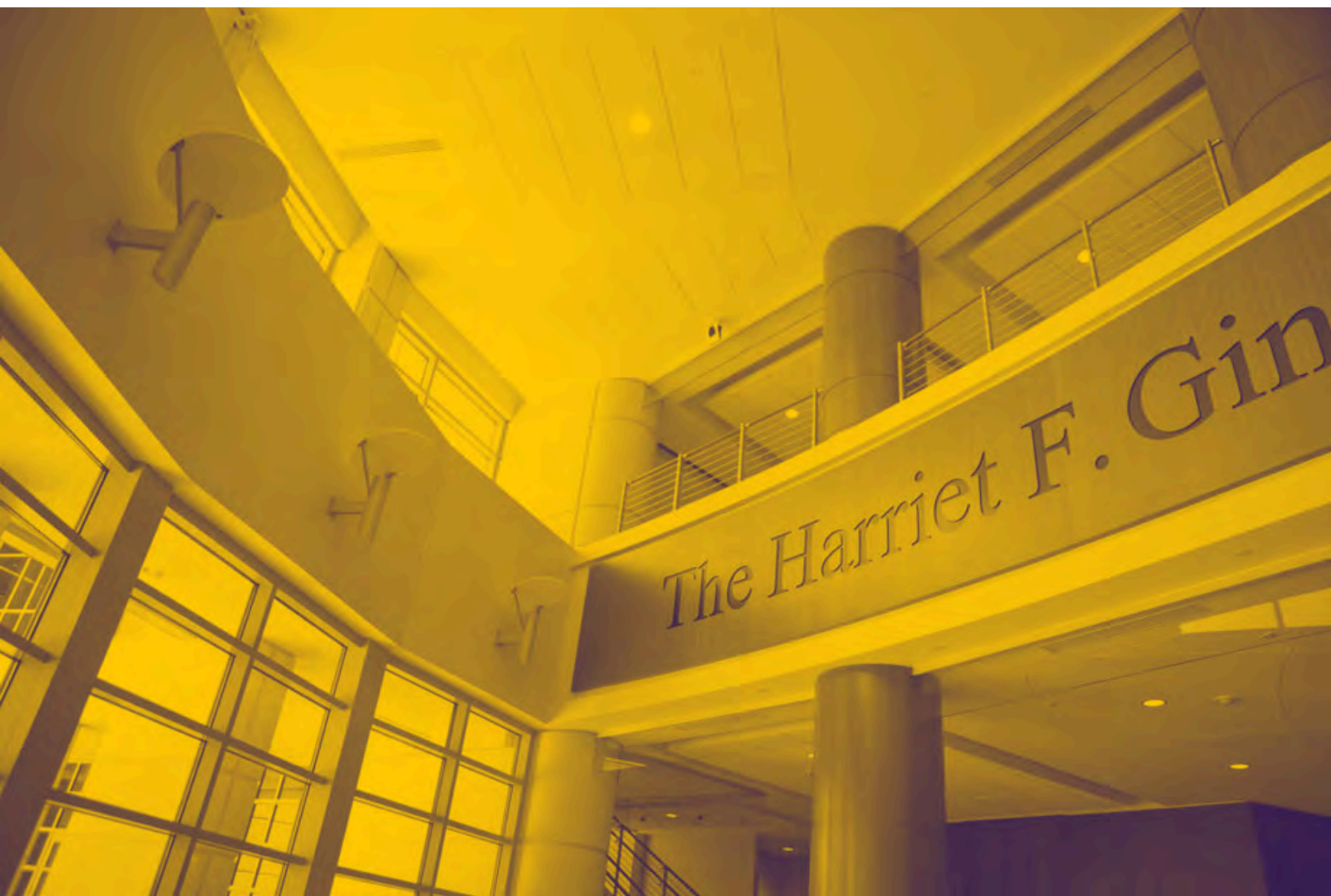
